## Orange Ex-Services Club Vinnies Van \$10,000 Grant

**Orange Ex-Services' Club** contributed to over \$150,000 in category 1 funding to 28 local projects run for the benefit of the Orange community. **Orange Vinnies Van Service** was honoured to be a recipient of a grant for \$10,000 for crisis support.

The St Vincent de Paul Society is most grateful for the recognition and support. Thank you!

## OCTEC Donation \$15,000 Grant

In response to the Vinnies Van Service Community Sleepout, local employment and training organisation OCTEC made a generous donation of \$15,000. Thank you OCTEC!

## Flood Grants – Department of Community and Justice

**Orange Regional Council** has been supporting flood affected community members from Eugowra, Molong, Canowindra and surrounds since the catastrophic flood event on 14 November 2022. Part of the support saw Conference Members from Orange, Canowindra, Cowra and Molong in attendance at the Vinnies Assistance days held at the Eugowra Bowling Club. Financial and pastoral care was provided to approximately 70 households per session. Over the past 2 years over 200 households on many occasions have received assistance from grant and Society flood assistance money.

The latest \$50.000 flood grant monies from the Department of Community and Justice allocated to our area assisted 54 households with 44 residents from Eugowra and 5 each respectively from Canowindra and Molong. Of the households, 31 were single households, 18 were couple households and three were household families. Most assistance requests were for water and land rates, electricity and gas bills, car expenses such as registration, insurance and repairs and home insurance costs. Our sincere thanks goes to all the Members who have and continue to support flood impacted community members through your local Conference and on our designated Vinnies Support days. The care and compassion shown as part of this Conference work has been exemplary. It has been of great benefit and very much appreciated by so many. We could not have done it without you.

#### Namoi Barwon Regional Council

In late October 2023, we received an NGO Flood Recovery Program Open Grant from DCJ to assist those most affected in the region of Walgett and the Moree Plains Shire, which were severely affected in the 2022 floods.

The total grant was \$50,000 which enabled the Society to offer specific assistance over a very large area of land to people who had lost a variety of household items, farming equipment, livestock, livelihood and in some cases their health and wellbeing.

Sixty- Eight families were assisted in total from our first point of contact on 5 Dec 2023 to our final one on 20 Sept 2024, taking the total number of people assisted to more than 100.

The items of most need were basic groceries including meat, outstanding rates notices, general household items including cleaning goods and chemist and health expenses which were neglected in households which deemed other expenses more important than their own health and welfare. This was most remarkable in our older rural Australians. Some too proud to accept let alone ask for help.

All local businesses in the region were used to supply the goods and services required and the owners were most appreciative as this helped get them "back on their feet" after suffering flood damage and loss themselves.

One lady just cried because it was her first "proper grocery order" in many months. She remarked, "I don't know what to choose first".

## **Bathurst Schools & Youth**

The schools of the Bathurst Diocese have again been incredibly generous with their continuing support for our Winter Appeal. St Laurence's Coonabarabran centred their donations on the Year One Mass, collecting items to the Year One classroom prior to the day.

St Pius X Primary at Dubbo held a Teddy Bears and a Chiily Day fundraiser, and the proceeds purchased 8 winter weight doonas.

St Marys' Primary at Dubbo held a Pyjama Day, which raised \$760.

St Laurence's Primary school asked their students to do chores around their homes; the donations raised purchased so many kettles, toasters and hygiene packs - I had trouble fitting them all in my car!

St John's Primary in Dubbo had a Snug as a Bug in a rug day which raised \$450.



Jo Taylor, the Religious Education Coordinator of St Pius X, said, "The teddy competition was for the various categories. We all wore PJs to school for a 'warm snuggly day'. I asked our local Vinnies if we could buy something tangible with the funds raised and it was suggested that we buy quilts. We were able to purchase 8 winter weight doonas to donate"

Cathedral Primary in Bathurst held a Knit In, which raised \$397 and their Mini Vinnies collaborated with the Ag Student group to create a feast from their own kitchen garden to honour their craft assistants. The newly formed Mini Vinnies at St Joseph's Manildra made a huge number of snack packs for the Orange Van. These snack packs consist of healthy items that children can take with them to schools the following day, so when they sit with their friends and eat they don't feel left out.

In Orange Catherine McAuley Primary Mini Vinnies held a Toy Sale, and St Mary's Primary at Orange raised \$300 with their fundraising.



St Mary's Primary School Dubbo raised \$760 for the Winter Appeal. Luke Wilson, the principal of St Mary's, said, "Our children are very aware that some people in our local community don't have access to heating and blankets to get through those cold winter nights. We hope that the money we raised helped some local families stay warm this winter."



Paula Clifford, the Religious Education Coordinator of St John's Primary, said, "Our students were asked to commit to donating something - either clothing/blankets from home (many were new) or if they had no material items, they would donate financially. We were able to buy many new pillows and doonas with the \$450 that we raised as well. All items were donated to our Dubbo Branch to support the people we see locally in need of our help. It was incredibly heartwarming to see our kids' faces when they saw how many donations were made over 11



## **Bathurst Schools & Youth**

For our high schools, three had sleepouts. St Matthews at Mudgee again had close to one hundred high school students participating, raising \$2700 on the night, and the next day held the Pyjama Day and tin collection from their primary school stocking St Mary's conference with close to two thousand tins of food!

La Salle Academy at Lithgow had 22 students at their sleepout and raised \$380 for St Patrick's conference, and St Raphael's in Cowra had 24 students from Year 10 doing a sleepout, raising money for ten blankets donated to their local conference.

James Sheahan at Orange held a hygiene products drive - this is a wonderful and discreet way to further assist people who frequent the van service.

Mackillop College at Bathurst held a Winter Appeal Casual Clothes Day and raised \$947 for Assumption conference in Bathurst.

St Stanislaus College at Bathurst was likewise generous, and held a St Vincent de Paul fundraiser which continued with the sale of Friends of Stannies merchandise throughout term three. They donated winter bedding and \$1500 to their local conferences.

## St Mary's Spirituality Day

Thirty-seven teachers attended this event at St Mary's School Orange on August 12. Topics included: introduction to the Society's works, Laudato Si (Climate justice and sustainability), Rerum Novarum, Catholic Social Teaching and the principles of the Society, followed by Vinnies Van training. Teachers were split-up into groups, with one group doing food prep and van work, and another doing hygiene and snack/food packs. Discussions included: volunteering with the Society, Mini Vinnies, and ways that students could actively work to support Vinnies with practical activities such as food preparation. Ten teachers went on to experience a Vinnies Van shift, making sandwiches and attending night patrol!

## **Vinnies Van Update**

Since the beginning of this year, 5th February - 1st October 2024, the Van Service has supported a total of **2438 individuals**, that's an average of **48.7 per night** with **children representing 61.5%** of the total. During this time the service has provided **30 referrals** to Conference's Care and Support and **2 referrals** to Housing Plus. Compared to the same period last year, where we assisted a total of 1588 individuals on a fortnightly service schedule. Since the introduction of a weekly service on 20<sup>th</sup> May, the new alternate week has quickly reached parity with numbers on the previous fortnight cycle.

## **Safeguarding & Compliance**

At Vinnies we hold ourselves to high standards – and they are necessary standards. We have a range of legislative obligations when it comes to working with children and vulnerable adults and the Society has a commitment to safeguarding children, young people and vulnerable adults. It is a fundamental aspect of our work in providing a hand up to those facing adversity. In order to meet our commitment, we are responsible for:

- <u>Reporting</u> our concerns about children and vulnerable adults
- <u>Screening</u> and onboarding checks for members
- <u>Safeguarding & Code of Conduct</u> training for members

Members whose **Working with Children** and **Police Checks** expire will be unable to participate in Conference work. Don't worry, your local office will be in touch with you in advance of your next expiry date and will provide support through the process.

## Safeguarding & Code of Conduct Training

Compliance with Safeguarding & Code of Conduct across the North West is low, and we need your help.

Members can do the training at their own pace, online, by going to <u>mavs.vinnies.org.au</u> and logging in with their email address and password.

Once logged in, go to 'Your Learning' on the right-hand side and you will see a list of self-guided learning modules. The important ones are Code of Conduct and Safeguarding Learning.

If you get stuck, please call or email your local office for help (see back page for contacts).

We are also exploring options for group training, however the self-paced online training is hopefully a convenient option for most members. Call us for support!

## **Reportable Concerns**

- A family with children is homeless
- A child or young person is homeless (not with parent/carers)
- A parent with children is fleeing, or discloses domestic violence
- Someone tells you that a child has been or is at risk of being harmed Including a coworker or person we assist
- You are concerned that a child may not be safe
- A family needs ongoing support for food, rent or bills
- An elderly person has no access to their money
- A person with a disability cannot access support
- A person with a mental health condition is living in squalor












