GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP!



Vinnies joined the national celebrations for NAIDOC week in July. NAIDOC stands for the 'National Aboriginal and Islander Day Observance Committee'. Over decades now, this week has celebrated the long history, deep culture and achievements of First Nations peoples.

"Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!" is this year's theme. It recognises the strength and resilience of First Nations people in fighting for justice, equity and recognition since the earliest days of European colonisation.

The organisers said, "We have a proud history of getting up, standing up and showing up. From the frontier wars and our earliest resistance fighters to our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities fighting for change today – we continue to show up."

They say, "Now is our time. We cannot afford to lose momentum for change."

And the momentum for change can be seen in the *Uluru Statement from the Heart*, where the First Nations Elders and leaders have invited us to walk together in "a

movement of the Australian people for a better future".

The Society of St Vincent de Paul supports the call of the *Uluru Statement* for the Constitutional recognition of First Nations people and an enshrined and protected National Voice to Parliament.

And we are not alone. The Australian Catholic Bishops and the Religious Orders through Catholic Religious Australia are among many church and community groups joining the call.

We have this wonderful opportunity to walk with First Nations people – to foster the dignity of and ancient living culture. To give a Voice that addresses hardship and historical abuses. And to ensure respectful relationships and truth telling in Australia.

All Australians are invited to join the growing movement to promote the protection of the environmental and cultural heritage of the First Nations peoples. It is a time to foster truth-telling and establishing constitutional recognition.

President said, "This event is a great opportunity to meet some of our Aboriginal Elders in the community and a way to look at our next step of action with the Reconciliation Action Plan."

Leo Tucker, Executive Director of Mission and Spirituality added, "Reconciliation should be part of our DNA. It shouldn't just be something that we talk about a lot. It needs to be right in the very heart of most things we think about, what we do and how we do that."

It was a great way to renew connections and forge new ones with the aims on Reconciliation and promoting the cultural competency of Vinnies.

The St Vincent de Paul Society annual Community Sleepout is being held on **Friday night August 19**, and we need you more than ever this year.



To top off the faith-filled day, students were fortunate enough to hear from Bishop Anthony Randazzo and members of Catholic Schools Youth Ministry International (CSYMA) and spent much of the day singing and dancing along to the live music performed by the extremely talented Alyssa Agius. The day then concluded with every attendee being presented with a jar of Holy Water, blessed by Bishop Anthony Randazzo. It truly was a spectacular day!

One Meal is all it takes

Conference members from the Chatswood Regional Council have been touring the Vinnies Youth Community Centre (VYCC) in Brookvale where ONE MEAL Co-Op works to provide healthy, nutritious food relief support for vulnerable, marginalised and at risk members of the community.

Conference members from Forestville, Willoughby,
Chatswood and Davidson have seen first-hand the functional
and operational side of the VYCC, which provides meals to
anyone in need – school children, homeless people and
those living in public housing. Food vans are organised on
certain evenings in nearby parks.



PROVIDING FOOD RELIEF FOR PEOPLE IN NEED IN OUR COMMUNITY

Donated boxes of vegetables and fruits, canned food and drinks are stored in different parts of the VYCC. A number of large commercial freezers (all donated) store frozen meat and other products. A pantry room is stacked with donated canned foods – soups, spaghettis, fruits to household items and personal hygiene products including nappies, milk powder donated by organisations and individuals.

Kim Williams manages the ONE MEAL CO-OP at VYCC and coordinates all the activities with the help of many volunteers. They are on a roster for food collection or packing cooked meals or in distributing the meals to homes or various areas. They coordinate the distribution of over 4000 meals a week – including on Saturdays and Sundays.

They have over 70 volunteers and are always on the lookout for more.

Feast for Freedom

We accept that behind every successful man there is a woman. Another truism is that behind every successful parish social event there is a team of women. This was amply borne out by the ladies of Our Lady of Dolours in Chatswood who hosted the inaugural Feast for Freedom on a balmy Saturday evening in March this year.

Simply put, they just accepted "the baton and took off with it". Running the anchor leg was none other than Jo Karaolis, a kindly lady of enormous energy, persuasiveness, and organising capability. After two months of preparation, Jo and her team put on a veritable feast from many nations.

As Jo explained, "The Feast for Freedom is an Australia-wide fundraising vehicle for the Asylum Seekers and Refugees Council of Australia. Our parish's Community Action Group took on the challenge of assisting refugees. Of course, for an undertaking of this size, we needed help from the Jesuit Refugee Society and we reciprocated by giving them the proceeds from our raffle."

As refugees and asylum seekers are from other than first-world countries, the food on offer for the Feast for Freedom necessitated their origin to be representative of those counties. This requirement was easily met by the various cooks of the Community Action Group who contributed food from

Afghanistan, Pakistan, Iran, Peru, Indonesia and Ukraine. Some of these cooks dressed in their traditional costumes.

Lending authenticity to the evening were two guest speakers, Nishadh Rego and Idrissa Dumbuya, asylum seeks from Afghanistan and Nigeria respectively. In the comfort of our

familiar surroundings, we find the hardship experienced by these asylum seekers hard to swallow. For example, Idrissa has been kept on a temporary visa for five years. "I can't reunite with my family. I can't even locate them. How painful is that?"

The evening was attended by 105 people. Among supporters of the event were St Vincent de Paul Forestville Conference members, members of the Rotary Club of Wahroonga, and generous parishioners who made up the rest.

"The Feast for Freedom brought in a surplus of \$6000 plus \$2400 from online donations," Jo said. She added, "Parishioners commented enthusiastically about the pleasure of being back together for dinner in the Harrington Hall after the COVID lockdown."

Will we have another Feast for Freedom next year?

Judging by the feedback from dinner guests as well as the cooks, this is a distinct possibility. With the experience learnt from the first Feast for Freedom, it will be half the effort and twice the pleasure to arrange another one. Stay tuned!



Students visit Hornsby VSC for Skills Passport

On 25th March, 15 students from Hornsby Kuringai College's Skills "Friendly staff, organised set up, some good brands. Reasonable Passport program came across to see how we work at Vinnies and how we help people in need.

These young people are not very interested in school and the Skills Passport shows them different work places to try to interest them in looking forward and to gain self-esteem. When the program ran last year we saw half of the participating young people later take up apprenticeships. Others went back to school and others learnt different skills to help them find work.

During the visit, Broken Bay President Michelle Chahine gave a talk about how Vinnies started and some of the things we do. The students packed small bags for the homeless. That was quite an experience for the students, as they did not know how people on the streets wash or carry their back packs with small items only. They did a role play around how to assist a person who lives on the street. And they helped to sort clothing for the shop downstairs.

We had a pizza lunch with them, which they really loved. We gave them Easter eggs and little cards with motivational comments for them to take and read.

Each student was given a clothing voucher. They really loved looking through the clothing and made some sensible choices of clothes. They were amazed at the great brands of clothing we had and said they would be back to purchase clothes.

We had some amazing comments from the students. I will share with you what they wrote to us about their experience at Vinnies:


The re/CYCLE range has just been refilled across 16 locations in metro Sydney. The range includes woven rugs, Turkish towels –

Join the Build Homes, Build Hope Letter-writing Campaign

Responding to the NSW State Budget released in June, the NSW Society's CEO Jack de Groot welcomed measures that will lead to positive impacts for women, children, First Nations Peoples, and people struggling to afford homes. But he noted that much more needs to be done in the funding of social housing.

"The lion's share of funding for social housing in this budget is going towards upgrading existing residences. This is both good and necessary and we also need significantly more new social housing dwellings.

"The number of new residences funded by this budget is in the hundreds when there are 50,000 applicants on the social housing waiting list in NSW. This represents over 100,000 people, many of whom wait 10 years or longer for a home.

"The social housing waiting list could be reduced by three quarters if 5,000 new social housing residences were built each year for the next decade," Mr de Groot said.

We, as Members of the Society, see the stress of homelessness and those with rental stress in the people we encounter when they ask for our assistance. The waiting list for social housing in every Conference area is growing. The risk of homelessness for young families, women fleeing domestic violence and elderly women has been well documented in the media.

The Society has an obligation to address the needs of these people. Amelie Housing cannot build all the homes that are needed. Nor can the other social housing providers. Funds are needed from the State government to be released so that they can begin to construct 5,000 units of social housing per year.

You can get an idea of the lived reality of the need in this short <u>Build Homes, Build Hope video</u> prepared by the Social Justice Team.

Can you contribute to our *Build Homes, Build Hope* letter writing campaign?

We aim to send the NSW Premier a letter a day in the 300 days leading up to the March 2023 election. Each letter would be a personal handwritten letter calling for 5,000 new social housing homes to be built every year for the next ten years

You can find the letter writing guide here. We ask that letters are addressed to the NSW Premier but sent to the Social Justice Team at 2C West St, LEWISHAM NSW 2049. They will then forward these letters on to the Premier.

I have drafted a letter. It is not a template but it may help you to write your personal letter:

Dear Dominic,

This letter is important to the people I try to support through my activities with the St Vincent de Paul Society.

We visit people in their homes and talk to them on the phone and from this we can assess their desperation in seeking social or affordable housing.

On the Central Coast at the last Census (2016) there was an increase in homelessness of 266 or 34.8% on the previous Census. Of this number 17.2% were Aboriginal.

There are 3,004 people on the waiting list for social housing. This is exacerbated by a 77% drop in private rental vacancies.

Recently, a single mother with 4 dependent children called on the Terrigal Conference of the Society for assistance. She works 20 hours per week in a local hotel and her income is \$1,888 per fortnight. 50% of this was going to pay their rent. This is well above the rental stress level of 30% of income. However, her landlord suddenly increased her rent to \$1,460 or 77% of her income.

There are no other affordable houses to which she can relocate in the local area. Are more low-income earners going to forced out of the area? Where will local businesses find their workers? Will this cause a social upheaval in our society?

From 1945 to 1971 Australia built 265,000 public housing dwellings. That is 10,000 per year when the need was not as great as today. We would like to see your government begin to repair the loss of public housing, that has occurred in recent decades, by building at least 5,000 dwellings per year.

This is inadequate for the current need but we must begin the process.

I look forward to your response to this letter.

Society State President Paul Burton launches 2021 Modern Slavery Statement

Modern Slavery is an issue that should concern us all.

Over 40 million people are enslaved in the world today. In Australia, it is estimated that around 15,000 people are enslaved, with the additional risk that procurement through international supply chains exposed to slavery adds to the global suffering.

Under the *Modern Slavery Act 2018*, the Society of St Vincent de Paul NSW has obligations to assess and prevent the risk of modern slavery in our operations and supply chains. Our latest Modern Slavery Statement has just been submitted to the Commonwealth and can be accessed here.

The Social Justice Team ran an online Modern Slavery Workshop on 26 July during which NSW Society State President Paul Burton delivered the following address to launch the 2021 Modern Slavery Statement:

It is no coincidence that we are launching this Statement in the lead up to the United Nations World Day Against Trafficking in Persons, this coming Saturday.

As we have heard, in Australia around 15,000 people are enslaved, with the

additional risk that procurement through international supply chains, exposed to slavery, adds to the global suffering of over 40 million people.

I ask this, concerning men, women and children persevering in substandard and completely unacceptable conditions, having no recourse to any medium which could potentially serve to improve their lot, and having no option, in return for their labour, but to accept the continual dismal handouts which do not even remotely apologise for anything more than the foundations for a subsistence existence and a constant link to a life of poverty and inequity. Can such circumstances be identified as other than slavery?

Under the Modern Slavery Act 2018, we are required to assess and prevent the risk of modern slavery in our operations and supply chains. So, this Modern Slavery Statement is part of those obligations.

But this endeavour is not just about meeting legislated obligations. It goes much deeper!

The Society of St Vincent de Paul is a values -based organisation. Our underlying concern for the women, children and men trapped in slavery is generated by our commitment to protect the sacredness of life, to defend the God-given dignity of each person and to show a unique concern for the most vulnerable.

This special concern – or 'preferential option for the poor' – is foundational to the Society of St Vincent de Paul and all our

good works.

As we know, The Rule states that no work of charity is foreign to the Society. We are called to seek out and find those in need.

This includes being vigilant for emerging injustices and forms of hardship throughout society.

The extent of Modern Slavery in Australia and around the world is one such area warranting growing awareness and appropriate action.

We are committed not only to alleviating the need of victims and survivors of Modern Slavery but also to identify the unjust structures that are the cause of it.

And so, I am honoured to launch our Vinnies NSW Modern Slavery Statement and I do so, humbly, in the words of our founder Blessed Frédéric Ozanam, when he said,

Charity is the Samaritan who pours oil on the wounds of the traveler who has been attacked. But, it is justice's role to prevent the attacks.

In charity and in justice, let us continue to raise awareness of the scourge of modern slavery in Australia and around the world.

the circumstances where we may encounter people who are enslaved or at risk and be prepared to report our concerns.

And please, spread the word about this Modern Slavery Statement among your colleagues and teams.

Need assistance applying for your online Police Check?

Membership and Community Engagement staff across Metro Region, attend some Vinnies Support Centres (VSCs) to assist Members apply for their online Police Checks. Thank you to the VSC Coordinators for opening their doors for this offer which is open to all Members and many have taken up the offer so far.

Other dates will be allocated at other VSCs and be communicated to President for their Members.

Members then simply RSVP to John Ferguson (Metro Member and Community Engagement Coordinator) with name, time preferences, Conference. He then confirms directions and details including the ID documents required to bring
