Dear Brothers and Sisters

It is a privilege to take up the position of President of the Wollongong Central Council and continue to work with my fellow Central Council members through this particular role.

I would like to thank Wollongong Central Council members both past and present for their encouragement and support. In particular, I thank and acknowledge Alex Popov, our outgoing President, for his hard work and dedication.

It is an opportune time to reflect on the role of our conferences and the Wollongong Central Council within the Saint Vincent de Paul Society.

The conference is the building block of our Vincentian Society. As individual Vincentians we should never underestimate our role within the Society. The central function of the conference is not charity but the spiritual development of members. 'Our founders conceived our vocation as a harmonious balance between spiritual life and social involvement' (President General, <u>The Record</u>, 1982).

All conference meetings should foster the spiritual growth of members. Spirituality is the purpose of the Society. Our goal is not to serve the poor, defined only as material or financial assistance, but to bring the Love and Peace of Christ. We are a Society of charity, not a welfare agency.

It is at conference meetings we develop two attributes of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society: charity (centring on one's love, benevolence and compassion) and justice (working towards everyone's individual rights in society to create a more equitable social order). Frederic Ozanam says, 'without attention being given to nurturing our own Christian love there will be no capacity for enhancing and developing the self-sacrificing love for one's neighbour.'

Vincentians use their spirituality as a springboard to do practical works in the community. It is im-

portant for conferences to abide by 'The Rule' and meet at least fortnightly, but preferably weekly. In the conference we "grow in friendship, service and spirituality, activating our faith through person-to-person contact' (<u>The Rule</u>: Part I, cl 1.2).

Conference life and conference work must always bring out the generosity of heart that is within all Vincentians to reach out to all. Louis Pasteur summarises this concept writing, 'I do not ask you what is your race, your faith or your opinion, but just what is your suffering.'

Conferences should also be the means of ensuring that Frederic Ozanam's vision, mission and aspiration are passed on to the young. We must pass on the light! It is the duty of conferences to develop in our youth the Vincentian spirit by establishing ties with Mini Vinnies in parish schools or being prepared to help a school to form one. High schools also have amazing social justice programs...we can encourage these as well.

It is the role of the Central Council to help conferences in the Wollongong Diocese to remain strong and committed. As Vincentians, we must maintain, through prayer and action, the mission of Frederic Ozanam and Sister Rosalie Rendu.

Over the last five months, the Society has been tested first by the bushfires and now by the Coronavirus. Please stay safe and remember to follow personal safety laws. They are there to protect you and to keep others safe. Thank you for your caring loving service to others. Vincentian works by individuals and conferences has been incredible.

Moss Vale Vinnies conference uses the local I.G.A. loyalty card for shopping bills. The I.G.A shop allocated 20 loyalty cards to Vinnies. These cards are issued to both groups and individuals. The aim has also been to have donated rewards points given to Vinnies when a customer swipes the key tag at the cash register. Accumulated points from all the key tags equates to a dollar value. When the conference does its own shopping, this dollar value is deducted from our shopping bill. Other key tag holders are generously offering their points to benefit the needy in our community.

Birthday Cards

The conference did not want clients to be forgotten, and the idea of sending a birthday card with a hand-written verse came to realisation. A large greeting card company agreed to send a box of birthday cards. With this encouragement conference members hope to bring a smile, hope and recognition that somebody is thinking about their wellbeing.

In 2019 a new initiative was conducted by Vinnies Moss Vale to reward client mothers to acknowledge their role in promoting a child's well-being and in greatly influencing a child's growth and development. Conference members were able to get support from local businesses. The conference gave mothers a choice of movie tickets, body and beauty treatment, shampoo, cut

A large crowd from the local community, Sydney, Wollongong and the far South Coast gathered at Ulladulla Civic Centre to show support for one another after the bushfires. Bishop Brian Mascord of the Diocese of Wollongong attended the event as well as Mr Peter Houweling, Wollongong Central Council President, Kathleen Thickett of the NSW State Council, and others representing bodies that serve the South Coast community.



Talk with a Vincentian Anna Leschnik, Shellharbour Conference

Where were you born?

I was born in the rural alpine region of Styria in Austria.

Tell me something about your parents and siblings, and early days while you were growing up.

When I was 2 years old I was fostered to families in the region. I had no contact with my mother for 8 years. My mother then remarried, and we became a family.

What school did you attend?

I attended primary school in Schwanberg. I went to high school in Vienna. I later completed a Master of Nursing at the University of Wollongong.

What was your schooling like? Was there one teacher you have particularly fond memories of?

I was very happy in primary school. But, I was seen as a "poor child". I did not wear shoes for most of the year. High school was difficult because I knew nothing about city life in Vienna.

When did you join the St Vincent de Paul Society? January 2012. I retired from nursing after 45 years and my husband passed away in 2004. I was introduced to All Saints conference and felt it was the right place for me to be able to contribute in a positive way.

Tell me something about the works of the Society at that time.

Our conference members work as a team. We provide a safe place, a listening ear, a welcoming smile and help with people's needs. We provide Christmas lunches for the elderly and Christmas hampers, and help the Brekky Club at the local high school and hostel visits.

Is there a particular incident or work that you have a particularly good memory of?

Yes. Every year we all work together to make our Christmas luncheon a happy event. There are times when a person or family overcomes a difficult situation. We are allowed to witness this in return for the small intervention by the Society.

Do you think the way we help people has changed over the years of your involvement with the Society? Yes and no. High rents and Newstart place many people below the poverty line. The Society helps in a small way. Volunteers are now getting older and are less



able to attend to home visits making it harder to understand people's circumstances.

What do you think you have gained from your involvement with the St Vincent de Paul Society?

I am grateful that God has led me to this kind of volunteering - the rewards far outweigh the effort. Lasting friendships with people that have God as their Lord and are of the same mind-set.

What gives you the greatest satisfaction in your works as a Vincentian?

To make someone's burden a little easier by listening with an attentive ear, and being allowed to provide help using the resources of the Society. To guide people to see their own strength and goodness, and help them to a place where they can plan a better future.

Do you have any other comments?

I hope at conference level we will always put first the person needing help. That involves walking with them awhile until they find the strength to carry on and find a meaningful solution to their situation. Society volunteers are thankful we are allowed to be a friend to all who need help.

What gives you the greatest satisfaction in your work as a Vincentian?

I gain satisfaction assisting clients as well as being involved in the Central Illawarra Regional High Schools Support Program, breakfast and mentoring programs. I regularly visit other conferences for a chat and collegiality.

Poverty is Not Only an Economic Issue

Tom Gersbach, Wollongong Central Council Social Justice Representative, has shared the following information with members.

In February 2020 a major report was released on poverty in Australia based on information for the years 2017-18. The report concludes that one in every eight adult Australians and one in every six Australian children currently lives below the poverty line. The report also identifies Newstart, Youth Allowance, Age Pension, Disability Support -stimulus-to-fight-poverty Pension and Carer Payment as falling below the poverty line. The report identifies a need to increase these payments as a very high priority.

Additionally, since this report was released, some temporary relief has been provided by the Commonwealth Government in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This temporary relief has included providing a supplementary payment to people who receive the Newstart allowance and one-off payments to some other welfare recipients and vulnerable community groups.

Those who might wish to take the opportunity to advocate for the amended payment to Newstart recipients to remain in place permanently in the

Because with the Lord there is mercy and with Him plentiful redemption,


And He will redeem Israel from all the iniquities.
