Changes to the Central Council

In all there are 5 changes to the Regional Presidents that have already occurred or will do so before mid-next year. Two have already been elected or appointed, being Rozelle (Cathie Edlington) and Liverpool (Michael Wright). Three are to be elected by mid-next year, being St George by November 2024, Macquarie in January 2025 and Sutherland by May next year. In addition, our long-serving Vice President, Social Justice (Michelle Fonti) is moving on after many years in this portfolio.

Initiatives

• Welfare and home visitation guidelines

This document has now been circulated throughout the membership and the Support Centre staff. Subject to any recommendations that may require further debate/consideration, they are expected to be operational by the end of the year. These guidelines will give members and Support Centre staff some clear indications as to the level and frequency of welfare assistance and the conducting of home visitations.

• Streamlining of the new member on-boarding processes

Meetings have been held with senior staff to try and streamline the at times cumbersome and time consuming on-boarding processes of prospective new members. Hopefully, there should be some progress made with this overall process by early next year.

Once again, a great thank you to members, staff and volunteers in assisting those who need our help over the course of the year.

As we approach the Christmas season, one of our busiest times of the year, the Christmas Appeal is in full swing. Local parishes, schools, and other community initiatives are coming together to support those in need, showcasing the generosity and compassion of our community.



A special congratulations to our Members, Volunteers, Vinnies Services, Retail, Vans, and Metro Staff for the success of the Metro Vinnies Community Sleepout at Western Sydney University, Parramatta. The event raised over \$81,000, with each of the three Central Councils receiving approximately \$27,000 to support those in need. Special thanks to Kate Conroy, Metro Manager for Member and Youth Engagement, and Deborah Dmoch, Metro Operations Support Officer, for their dedication in making this event a success. With 140 registered attendees and 80 participants spending the night in solidarity, it was a powerful reminder of the challenges faced by those experiencing homelessness.

The McKell Institute's new report, Immediate Aid, Measurable Impact: Examining the Effectiveness of Emergency Relief, highlights the significant impact of the Society's work in NSW. The report, based on a survey of 900 clients, reveals that 80.4% of clients had a positive experience with emergency relief, and 78.1% credited Vinnies with helping them achieve stability. The report, launched at our Hurstville Vinnies Support Centre, emphasises the vital role we play in preventing crises such as eviction and hunger. We were honoured to have Federal Minister Amanda Rishworth MP and Linda Burney MP join us for this important event.

We've also introduced Vinnies Gift Cards, replacing traditional assistance vouchers, providing families with more flexibility and dignity in meeting their needs. For more information, visit the MAVS website.

Conference News

Macquarie Regional Council – Conference Collaborations

Some years ago the NSW State Government closed the Ivanhoe Housing Commission Estate at North Ryde to build high rise apartments mostly for the private market. After a robust debate it was agreed there would be approximately 900 units for Community Housing. The first two high rise apartment blocks finished late last year and they contained 259 apartments for Community Housing and 120 for Affordable Housing.

in March, 2024, we suddenly started to receive many cases from these new clients, most of whom were formerly homeless. They had very few possessions apart from their clothes. It was not practical for the North Ryde Conference to cope with this big load of complex and needy cases. As such, we shared the caseload across four of our Conferences - Eastwood, Marsfield. North Ryde and Ryde.

We soon ran through the money we normally raise and the Region's ERF. David Murphy and Bhavika Patel, who managed the Metro Vinnies Support Centres (VSCs) were very supportive and assisted us with further funding. Auburn VSC were taking our calls at that time and did a great job.

Overall. there were over 100 new clients and many return calls to assist in a short space of time. A really good outcome and some fine teamwork for our dedicated Conference Members, Presidents, volunteers and staff!!

North Ryde Conference Member, Peter McConnell Retired from Vinnies on 30 June, 2024.


Peter is 91 years old. He started volunteering with St Vincent de Paul Society in 1957 in Rockhampton, QLD, just a year after migrating from Ireland.

Funds raised through the Christmas Appeal will be used to fund our core programs including supporting people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, and also people struggling with poverty and cost-of-living pressures.

We reached and exceeded our event targets for both fundraising and participant registrations, so a big thank you to everyone for your hard work in setting this event up to be a great success both on the night and in terms of raising awareness and funds for all our Central Councils across Metro.

The fundraising target was \$52,000. And a whopping **\$81,392** was raised via participant sponsorship, donations and auction sales.

The Greater Sydney Community Sleepout attracted around 140 participants who attended in person or online, with about 80 who slept rough overnight. The Community Sleepout was again a great way to get friends, colleagues and community groups involved with Vinnies for just one night. By combining fundraising and awareness, together we can help prevent homelessness from happening in the first place for many people affected by disadvantage in our local communities across Broken Bay, Greater Sydney and Broken Bay Central Councils.

This intent is something we never lose sight of and it remains a focus every day.

We had a powerful and enjoyable program for the evening where many participants not only experienced what it is like to sleep out for a night, but also interacted with various Vinnies' programs and services. And all got to listen to the Vinnies Forbes St Band.

We would like to take a moment to acknowledge the participants, volunteers, members, speakers, sponsors and the Forbes Street Band for your generous support and contributions. Your support makes it possible for us to hold this important annual fundraising event.

The two Central Councils combined to hold a retreat as detailed above. The interchange between members was very productive. It was interesting to see how differently our Vincentian Mission is conducted across the Central Councils. They ranged between the homeless in the inner city with the high-rise blocks of units to rural areas in the Blue Mountains to the working poor.

The agenda saw the following topics presented and discussed, with some revealing outcomes.

They included discussions around the proposed welfare and home visitation guidelines and developments with Youth and how they can be assimilated into the adult Conferences. The Spiritual sessions looked at how we meet those that we assist (seeing Christ in the poor – the Mary and Martha story), discernment in our interactions with those people and how do we say no to requests where we have limited resources.

We attended a deeply moving Mass on the Saturday night celebrated by Bishop Terry Brady in the chapel onsite, which was also attended by the Josephite nuns who live in the complex. All attendees came away from the retreat feeling spiritually refreshed and stimulated with the Vincentian spirit.

Northern Sydney Homelessness Forum

June, 2024: The Northern Sydney Homelessness Forum at the Vinnies Crows Nest Centre was a resounding success, bringing together a full house of staff from various agencies—including aged care, mental health, youth services, disability, housing, and local council representatives—to address homelessness in Northern Sydney. Members from each Conference in the Northern Suburbs also attended to show their support.

Dominique Rowe, CEO of Homelessness NSW, delivered a powerful keynote on the state of homelessness in New South Wales and encouraged continued collaboration between agencies. The forum featured interactive activities that fostered collaboration and problem-solving among participants, culminating in a lively "Pitch It to the PM" session where each table presented solutions to a mock Prime Minister. Regional President Peter Marshall's pitch was particularly animated!

Agencies committed to concrete actions regarding homelessness and agreed to work together to create a comprehensive resource outlining services for both agencies and those in need. Plans were also made for another forum in 2024, inviting other agencies to sponsor and host the event.

Our rigorous preparation paid off, with positive attendee feedback and the joy of meeting long-time contacts in person. The event was catered by the Darcy Street Project, a Social Enterprise determined to break the cycle of homelessness, unemployment and social exclusion by using an education, coffee and food culture as a vehicle for social impact.

The atmosphere was inspiring, with many meaningful discussions had throughout the day. As a key organiser representing Vinnies, along with St George Community Housing and North Sydney Council, I felt proud and accomplished to host such a passionate and hardworking group of frontline staff. Vinnies Workshops at St Patrick's College Strathfield's Justice & Advocacy Forum

On the 20th of August, St Patrick's College Strathfield held their annual Justice & Advocacy Forum for Year 10 students. The theme for the day was – "Don't Be a Bystander – Never See a Need Without Doing Something About It." The day started with the introductory sessions on the meaning of advocacy and pathways for action, following which the students chose to attend two social justice workshops run by seven non-profit organisations including St Vincent de Paul Society. The day concluded with a panel and a prayer service.

Ket from Vinnies ran two social justice workshops on the day on the topic – "Don't be a bystander: Advocate to Make Housing More Affordable." The workshop content first delved into the meaning of a bystander and its implications on wider society, in contrast to being an advocate, and then highlighted the good works of Vinnies in the advocacy space regarding fairer housing, especially the recommendations for expanding and repairing social housing. Using interactive games with the participants, the workshops illustrated the severe lack of secure and affordable rental housing for people on low incomes in NSW. The students were then encouraged to join their local housing forum with their families and communities to learn more about housing issues in their locality and attend trainings to formulate their asks to the local candidates before the local government elections on the 14th of September.

The Vinnies' workshops were a success, with the participants inspired to use their voices to advocate as well as build relationships with their local council and people in their local area who are working to change the system in the long run, such that the housing market becomes more just and equitable for all.

RU OK? ANY DAY - Vinnies Vans event held in Bankstown

There were around 48 women and 25 children. They enjoyed a great meal (thanks Josie for organising), cakes, coffee, tea, water and soft drinks. We also took some toiletry packs and best of all some toys for the kids.

They were all so happy. There were approximately 38 referrals but best of all there was so much interest in what we do and our name is out there now.

Great news is we are doing something similar in Georgette's area, being Auburn/Liberty Plains Regional Council. Details to be announce soon.



City to Surf- Team Vinnies is Off and Running

Meet some of the amazing people who have recently raised much-needed funds by lacing up their running shoes for Team Vinnies.

A big thank you to the team from Houston Group, a Surry Hills based strategic brand & design agency who represented Team Vinnies on Sunday, 28 July at the 2024 Real Insurance Sydney Harbour 5&10k Run. The run, a one lap loop, began in the historic Rocks district with the circuit hugging the Sydney Harbour foreshore taking in Cockle Bay, Darling Harbour, Barangaroo Reserve and finishing the near the Overseas Passenger Terminal, Circular Quay. By all accounts, the sports-loving bunch 'smashed' the 10k run and raised some all-important funds for Vinnies.

On Sunday, 11 August Rosie Drum gathered with 80,000+ other participants in Sydney's CBD to take part in the world's largest fun run, the City2Surf. Running about 14 kilometres from the city to Bondi Beach, Rosie had a goal to 'dream big' while flying the flag for Team Vinnies and raise as much money as possible by the time she crossed the finish line. As a long-time Vinnies enthusiast and member of Randwick Conference with a passion for running, Rosie took her City2Surf preparation seriously with regular training sessions which ultimately paid off as she describes, "I really enjoyed it! It was gruelling but a whole lot of fun." Crossing the finish line 10 minutes behind her sister (who runs marathons!) and surpassing her fundraising goals left Rosie feeling "pretty chuffed.".

Like Rosie, Shemariah Gibbs-Williams also took part in Sydney's City2Surf on Sunday, 11 August for a reason close to her heart, having worked with Vinnies and "seen firsthand the tremendous care and hard work that goes into assisting those in need." Originally from the UK, this was Shem's first-time taking part in the iconic Sydney marathon and it didn't disappoint. With a game plan to "half-run and half-walk" the route it wasn't long before the atmosphere and high vibes of those around her along with a favourite podcast playing in her ears had Shemariah in the zone and finishing strong after crossing the finish line having run the whole way.

Giving a hand up for Vinnies

Buddies Day stories

The Buddies Day program has achieved significant success, thanks in large part to grant funding that supports children from families assisted by Vinnies. This program provides these children with valuable opportunities to challenge themselves, interact with their peers, benefit from positive role models, and enjoy a respite from any difficulties they may be facing at home.



We offer two distinct types of Buddies Day Programs. The first involves educational outings, such as visits to venues like the Reptile Park, where children engage in hands-on learning about native Australian fauna and flora. The second type of program involves activities conducted at local high schools. Here, high school students design and lead activities for the children, gaining experience in volunteer work. Activities have included cupcake decorating, tie-dyeing t-shirts, various arts and crafts, ball games, dance parties, treasure hunts, face painting, and more.

Several success stories highlight the impact of the program.

For instance, Rachel (name changed for privacy) had recently relocated to the area after her family was displaced due to domestic violence. Over a six-month period in a Vinnies safe house, Rachel participated in five Buddies Day events. She remained highly engaged throughout, with her favourite part being the fun bags filled with toys and prizes. Upon moving to more stable housing, Rachel excitedly shared with her case worker, "I now have enough toys to put in my new room."

Another example is Joey (name changed for privacy), who joined the program four months ago. Initially, Joey was very quiet, shy, and reserved, staying close to his sister during his first Buddies Day and avoiding participation in activities. However, with the continued support of students and Vinnies volunteers, Joey gradually began to engage more. By his second Buddies Day, he started interacting independently with other children and volunteers. By the end of that day, he was so enthusiastic about the experience that he eagerly enquired about the next event for the following week. These success stories underscore the significance of the Buddies Day program and its positive impact on children at a crucial developmental stage.

The Buddies Day program plays a crucial role in enriching the lives of children from families supported by Vinnies, offering them invaluable opportunities for growth, social interaction, and joy during challenging times. The positive transformations observed in participants, such as increased confidence and engagement, highlight the program's profound impact.



Winter Appeals across the Sydney Archdiocese Schools

It has been a busy Winter Appeal time for the Schools Engagement team (and my first since starting with the Society last December).

Primary and secondary schools across the Archdiocese have demonstrated incredible generosity this year, despite the rising cost of living and the risk of donor fatigue. Schools continue to see the importance of the work of Vinnies in the community, and throughout the Appeal I had the chance to speak at many schools about the impact the donations from schools have on those who receive them. Many schools also took up the chance to host a sleepout event this year, raising awareness of homelessness and further linking to their fundraising efforts.

A common request from schools this year came from Year 3 teachers seeking to connect Vinnies with their Religious Education curriculum. These visits provided an opportunity to show how the Society continues the work of Jesus in the world today and how through the work of Conferences and Vinnies services, we see the face of Christ in those we serve.

There have also been many schools keen to be of service this year and see the value of giving their time to support Vinnies. Fostering relationships between schools and the Society has seen teacher and parent groups assist regional Support Centres, programs and Vans for one-off opportunities as well as joining ongoing volunteer rosters.

Winter Appeal also offered the chance for me to speak to hundreds of secondary students as part of the Sydney Catholic Schools 10:10 program. Over two nights, students' perceptions of homelessness were challenged and they were presented with an overview of how Vinnies is supporting refugees and people seeking asylum.

In July I also had the chance to meet with the secondary Religious Education Coordinators to share with them how their schools can continue to support our mission, starting with their local Conference. I look forward to seeing this bear fruit in the future.

"It was so touching and it just shows how our little school has such a big heart and if our kindergarteners can do it, I invite others in the community to also donate any items they can spare to St Vinnies."


School Principal Mr Kelley Conlan said the 2024 Vinnies Winter Appeal focused on the working homeless, an emerging group of people who were encountering housing hardship and disadvantage despite being in employment.

Each Anti-Poverty Week, the St Vincent de Paul Society NSW holds the Rosalie Rendu Forum, a discussion bringing together a panel of distinguished women, named in recognition of Sister Rosalie Rendu's contribution to the Society, to offer insights into pressing social justice issues.

The 2024 Rosalie Rendu Forum put the focus on rental reform by proposing the question, "is ending no grounds evictions the end of the story?"

We were delighted to have Trina Jones (NSW Rental Commissioner), Dr Jemima Mowbray (Tenants' Union of NSW), Dr Penelope Bowyer-Pont (Macquarie University) and Anna Scott (Vinnies Services) join us for an online discussion moderated by Solange Frost (Vinnies South Regional Director).

Issues raised during the evening included the experiences of people supported by the Society in navigating the rental market, the impact of the government's proposed reforms, examples of rent regulation from around the world, the need to improve the quality of rental housing and giving renters the confidence to exercise their rights.

The panel also fielded questions from close to 100 attendees watching online and at viewing events on topics such as fair limits for rent increases, offering tenants longer-term leases, reforms for boarding houses and the role of the NSW Rental Commissioner.


The evening concluded with each of the panelists offering hopes for the future:

Our recommendations for a more just and compassionate NSW - new Social Justice Statements

Imagine an Australia where people have affordable and healthy housing that feels like home. Where everyone can live safely within their own homes and be treated with respect in their relationships. Or where everyone can access the daily essentials they need - like nutritious food and affordable energy.

These are just some of the aspirations that the Society NSW's new Social Justice Statements set out. You can find them now on website. The Statements, approved by State Council, outline the Society's social policy positions. They were developed by the Policy and Advocacy Team in collaboration with the NSW Social Justice Committee following consultation with staff, services and the sector.

Together the Social Justice Statements set out the Society NSW's recommendations in eight priority areas of homelessness, housing, renting, cost of living, domestic and family violence, drug and alcohol, climate justice and temporary protection visa. A First Nations Social Justice Statement is currently under consultation and development.

So how can you help to promote our recommendations to create a more just and compassionate society? We encourage all members, volunteers and staff to read and promote these Statements. In particular, you can help by advocating for the recommendations set out in the Statements with your local MP or local council member and discuss the key issue/s that your region, suburb or community faces.



Vinnies members opening doors for a Mum and children

Two caring St Vincent de Paul Society members completed a home visit to a Mum and her two children. The family of three were renting one room in a house filled with other renters – all strangers to the Mum and her children. Due to the children living in overcrowded conditions, the members phone Safeguarding with their concern. The members were happy for Safeguarding to call the Mum to discuss possible supports.

During the Mum's discussion with Safeguarding, it came out that she didn't want to engage with any housing services for help as she had thought that it meant she and her children would have to move to the outer suburbs of Sydney, disrupting the children's schooling and social networks. She thought her only option to remain living in her local area was to save harder to eventually afford a private rental whilst living in one room in a house of strangers.

Vinnies members continue to help with food and material supports, and the call to Safeguarding resulted in opening doors for the Mum to seek support from housing providers and find alternative accommodation in her local area.






