As we approach the Christmas season, one of our busiest times of the year, the Christmas Appeal is in full swing. Local parishes, schools, and other community initiatives are coming together to support those in need, showcasing the generosity and compassion of our community.



A special congratulations to our Members, Volunteers, Vinnies Services, Retail, Vans, and Metro Staff for the success of the Metro Vinnies Community Sleepout at Western Sydney University, Parramatta. The event raised over \$81,000, with each of the three Central Councils receiving approximately \$27,000 to support those in need. Special thanks to Kate Conroy, Metro Manager for Member and Youth Engagement, and Deborah Dmoch, Metro Operations Support Officer, for their dedication in making this event a success. With 140 registered attendees and 80 participants spending the night in solidarity, it was a powerful reminder of the challenges faced by those experiencing homelessness.

The McKell Institute's new report, Immediate Aid, Measurable Impact: Examining the Effectiveness of Emergency Relief, highlights the significant impact of the Society's work in NSW. The report, based on a survey of 900 clients, reveals that 80.4% of clients had a positive experience with emergency relief, and 78.1% credited Vinnies with helping them achieve stability. The report, launched at our Hurstville Vinnies Support Centre, emphasises the vital role we play in preventing crises such as eviction and hunger. We were honoured to have Federal Minister Amanda Rishworth MP and Linda Burney MP join us for this important event.

We've also introduced Vinnies Gift Cards, replacing traditional assistance vouchers, providing families with more flexibility and dignity in meeting their needs. For more information, visit the MAVS website.

Everyone deserves access to the essentials needed to live with dignity.

Even in difficult times, people should feel secure knowing they can afford a home, put food on the table, pay their bills, and maintain their health. This is especially true at Christmas. Everyone should be able to bring joy to their loved ones without the stress of unpaid bills, the cost of a Christmas gift, or the worry of providing a meal on Christmas Day.

Unfortunately, for so many people throughout our state this is the reality as we continue to endure an incredibly tough economic climate.

The theme of this year's Christmas Appeal is focusing on the devastating and unrelenting impacts of the ongoing cost-of-living crisis and the immediate, practical and emotional support the Society can provide to help people get back on their feet.

As households feel the continued brunt of cost-of-living pressures and have no expenses left to cut back on, our members and programs are responding to increasing demand. Close to 100,000 people have been supported across the state by our members over the last year. For many, they are living in a constant state of 'survival mode' and cannot envision a brighter future.

Fortunately, the Society can offer the support people need with food, clothing, household bills and more, along with connecting them with ongoing assistance and services. Crucially, our members give people in need hope for the future.

The Society thanks our dedicated Members for the important role they play in raising funds for the Christmas Appeal so we can continue to meet the rising need of the most vulnerable people in our community. **The Christmas Appeal was launched on 1 November 2024.** Materials to support your Christmas Appeal efforts, such as posters, donation envelopes and conference booklets have been distributed to Vinnies Support Centres.

Funds raised through the Christmas Appeal will be used to fund our core programs including supporting people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, and also people riggling with poverty and cost-of-living pressures.

Greater Sydney Community Sleepout Friday 30th August





We reached and exceeded our event targets for both fundraising and participant registrations, so a big thank you to everyone for your hard work in setting this event up to be a great success both on the night and in terms of raising awareness and funds for all our Central Councils across Metro.

Thank you for spreading the word amongst your networks!

The fundraising target was \$52,000. And a whopping **\$81,392** was raised via participant sponsorship, donations and auction sales.

The Greater Sydney Community Sleepout attracted around 140 participants who attended in person or online, with about 80 who slept rough overnight. The Community Sleepout was again a great way to get friends, colleagues and community groups involved with Vinnies for just one night. By combining fundraising and awareness, together we can help prevent homelessness from happening in the first place for many people affected by disadvantage in our local communities across Broken Bay, Greater Western Sydney and Broken Bay Central Councils.

This intent is something we never lose sight of and it remains a focus every day.

We had a powerful and enjoyable program for the evening where many participants not only experienced what it is like to sleep out for a night, but also interacted with various Vinnies' programs and services. And all got to listen to the Vinnies Forbes St Band.

We would like to take a moment to acknowledge the participants, volunteers, members, speakers, sponsors and the Forbes Street Band for your generous support and contributions. Your support makes it possible for us to hold this important annual fundraising event.

Spare a moment to help spread the above successes across your networks and teams, of our Greater Sydney Community Sleepout.

Broken Bay members and staff unite for the Greater Sydney Community Sleepout

It was great to attend the Greater Sydney Community Sleepout at the Rydalmere Campus of the University of Western Sydney. I attended with El Herlianto and Barry Finch from the Chatswood Region. Shirley Kelynack, Kenneth Laing and Jodie Davidson represented the Hornsby Region, pictured above.

The format of the evening included a meal of soup and a roll before various speakers told us some bigpicture facts and other members related their experiences with Vinnies. There were various stalls outlining activities Vinnies are involved in.

Following are some of the main recent statistics presented:

- 123,000 Australians face homelessness on any given night
- Vinnies NSW helped 85,000 people last year
- 36% of households have had food deprivation on occasion
- 40% of those seeking help are employed
- 1 in 3 have not asked for assistance before
- 1 in 5 of the people Vinnies assist are Indigenous
- The fastest growing group of those seeking assistance are women over 55
- Family violence is the main category of people seeking assistance

The Labor member for Parramatta, Donna Davis, also spoke. Her main points were:

- On average, it takes 5 years to work your way through the social housing list in NSW
- Some people have been homeless for 20 years
- Homeless people's life expectancy is about 25-30 years less than the average Australian
- Homelessness is more of a problem in the Northern Rivers, and in the south and west of the state (impacted by natural disasters)
- The NSW government is spending \$6.6 billion in this year's budget on housing; \$5.6B to build 8400 homes, at an average cost of \$667,000, and \$1 billion on maintenance. Local Governments with the exception of Byron Bay, the City of Sydney and Sydney City are not directly involved in combatting homelessness.

Three Vinnies members, John Neylan (volunteer GWS Vinnies Van), Ken Laing Member, Broken Bay Central Council and Tom Story, President Sydney Regional Council answered questions posed by Ashvini Ambihaipihar, Regional Director, Metro.

The main themes to their answers were:

- Needs are increasing,
- The workload in Central Sydney is much bigger than Forestville with 2500 people being helped with visits; some people on Newstart live in terrible conditions;
- It's a privilege to meet and help people who are struggling.

Some hardy souls stayed on at the University and slept on a sheet of cardboard with another sheet folded into a V shape to make a small open tent. El, Barry and I ventured home to do our own version of homelessness. Barry and El did some couch surfing while I camped out on the back deck. Fortunately, it was a warm winter's night. However, an hour or two before dawn the wind came up and I got cold because I only had a light sleeping bag as cover. Like previous sleepouts, you wake up tired. I can't imagine how one would manage if there were worries about personal safety and the discomfort.

The aim of the night was to raise funds for the homeless. The whole event reached its target of \$50,000, eventually raising over \$80,000. My Forestville team raised \$1400. Thanks to everyone who supported me. I raised some funds for the homeless but also got to appreciate the misery of homelessness a little more.

P.S. Assume you want to get into the market for an apartment worth \$667,000. Having saved a deposit you want to take out a \$600,000 loan and you have a decent salary of \$100,000 p.a. At the moment, repayments over 30 years at 6.29% are \$3,700 per month or \$44,400 per year. Tax on your salary is \$22,700, leaving \$32,900 to live on annually, \$632 per week. No crushed avocado breakfasts for you!

Listening to the story of Homelessness

Last night, I took part in the Vinnies Community Sleepout virtually. This is my fifth Community Sleepout and I couldn't be prouder of raising awareness and donations towards the rising issue of homelessness. It was great to represent the Wyong Region and the homeless clients Wyong supports daily.

In my role as Wyong Support Centre Coordinator, I take responsibility for seeing and experiencing homelessness, like the many clients who are homeless that get supported through my support centre and the countless other support centres in Sydney and the Central Coast.

Homelessness can happen to anyone, at any time. Nobody asks to be homeless although, unfortunately, homelessness can impact anyone within a single moment. What can cause homelessness includes:

- Daily living cost rises
- High unaffordable rents or mortgages
- Mental health concerns
- Addictions
- Relationship/Family breakdowns
- Escaping Domestic Violence
- Unsafe living conditions
- Overcrowded accommodation.



My provisions for the Sleepout were two cold sausages, a slice of bread and a bottle of water. For my Sleepout location this year I choose to put myself in the mindset of a homeless client with a pet and having to to sleep where I felt safest. So, treating my house as abandoned, I slept on the floor with a small blanket and cushion. I choose a different type of homeless situation each year to get a brief understanding of what the clients we assist in these exact situations face every night. This year I chose an abandoned House setting with a pet.

I gave myself no access to TV, showers, toilet, electricity and all the luxuries that I am grateful for. Instead, I had one small battery torch for light, my mobile phone (no charging allowed) for entertainment, and a companion (my friend's dog I was minding), a small amount of food provisions all restricted to one room. This setting identifies just one situation of many the homeless are faced with. Often throughout Wyong I see clients who identify as homeless and have pets. Often they care for their furry loved ones over themselves without question and keeping them safe and warm is their focus and priority. After I finished virtually attending the Sleepout around 9.30 pm I went to bed.

What I personally experienced throughout the night included:

- Feelings of isolation, vulnerability and being alone
- Feeling sore all over my whole body and the next morning having mobility issues due to sleeping on a hard surface
- Feeling drained, exhausted with no energy
- Having endless amounts of time to think about all my life choices and analyse everything
- Being in a dark room, hoping for it to be daylight soon
- Worrying about my furry friend constantly all night
- Feeling restless, uncomfortable, cold & anxious
- In desperate need of a shower, as I have worn the same clothes all day after my busy solo day at the support centre
- Broken, inadequate quality of sleep.

I quickly put myself in the shoes of the countless people who are homeless. Unfortunately, they endure this situation, and many other situations like this, every night. The next morning, around 5.00 am, besides needing a shower and a decent sleep, I was sore, walking was uncomfortable, my energy level was low, my hunger was high, mental health had set in.

The Central Coast Region, like many other regions, desperately needs more affordable stable housing options. All the Vinnies Support Centres assist people daily who identify as homeless and in need of such supports as housing, food, clothing, blankets, showers, hygiene products, travel supports (opal cards / fuel cards) and many more services, referrals and supports from the community for the holistic assessment of our most vulnerable members of our community.

The feedback I and my team at Wyong VSC receive from the people we assist who are homeless often goes like this: "I just want someone to listen to my story. Every time I come to Wyong VSC you provide me with that and I feel valued, heard, important and a part of the community... Vinnies always listen to my story without judgement and provides me options and a listening ear".

So, we can start to look forward and she can start to learn and focus on getting her education back on track so she can have a bright and promising future. It's been a while since I was able to feel hope like I do again today for my daughter. Thank you so much for your help and support from the bottom of my heart, from my whole family. You've given a young lady another chance today and that literally means everything.

My son was first assessed and diagnosed as autistic when he was three years old. But this timed out at seven years of age. My son is now 14.

I haven't been able to apply for NDIS funding for my son because I have never been able to afford the cost of the re-assessment the NDIS application requires.

St Vincent de Paul at Brookvale and St Cecilia's Parish family have been a wonderful support for us, most especially a beautiful lady, Lyn, without whom I would not have even been considered let alone been gifted this opportunity of financial support. I would like to take this opportunity not only to thank you but also to let you and the Rockpool Foundation members and donors know just how much it means to me to be a recipient of your generosity.

Back to the future

As you can see in this Letter of Aggregation, Harbord Conference was formed on the 28th October 1957. A quick look at the photo shows it in English and French. I don't have any details of members at that time, but I do have a record for March 1978.

We have to remember that in those days only men were members. The ladies in the parish belonged to the St Therese Society. There were 25 members and 11 associate members. They all worked full time and did visits at night. Requests for help came through the parish priest.

The Conference would raise funds by delivering phone books for the Post Office, having cake days after mass and a whole range of activities relying on the generosity of parishioners. Every two months they would have a truck at church for clothing donations.

Some of the phone numbers were 932530 or 972020. How times have changed. They have now all gone to heaven for their just reward. Because of all the hard work of every Society member in those days I feel the Society has grown into an organisation that can reach out to those in need in a more helpful and compassionate way. There are now 8 members in Freshwater (old Harbord) Conference as we carry on the our mission to help those who need our help.

RECOMMENDATIONS WITH WHICH CONFERENCES SHOULD MAKE THEMSELVES FAMILIAR

1. CAREFUL ATTENTION IN THE SELECTION OF MEMBERS

Conferences should exercise the utmost discretion in the admission of new members. Whilst conformity to the laws of the Church is the bare minimum qualitication, in actual practice a high standard is expected of those who are proposed for membership. Not only should they be exemplary Catholics, but should bear an irreproachable reputation both in regard to their private lives and to their dealing in business matters. Neglect of these obvious precautions may result in a Conference becoming a purely philanthropic institution instead of a Christian association, and may even give cause for scandal.

It is also advisable that new members should enter our ranks at their own request; that they should appear to be imbued with love of the poor, or at least appear capable of acquiring that love, and lastly, that they should not be of a temperament likely to disturb the peace and cordiality of our meetings.

ZEAL IN VISITING THE POOR

The visition of the poor in their homes is our fundamental work of net the detaken by or Conferences. It is the easiest work the same time the best calculated to develop in

4. FREQUENT INTERCOURSE WITH OTHER CONFERENCES

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It is a mistake for a Conference to isolate itself from the rest of
the Society, for thus it loses its corporate character. We belong

Busking for Vinnies Parramatta - 2024

Schools across Western Sydney have brought music to the streets of Parramatta as part of the annual 'Busking for Vinnies' initiative this August. 'Busking for Vinnies' has been a long-standing community outreach event, supported by Parramatta Council, held by the St Vincent de Paul Society NSW annually in Parramatta since the 1990s to raise awareness of the Society's services in the region.

Our Lady of Mercy College in Parramatta launched 'Busking for Vinnies' on Wednesday 21 August at Centenary Square. Parramatta Marist High School (Westmead), Mt Saint Benedict College (Pennant Hills), St Edmund's College (Wahroonga) and St John Paul II Catholic College (Schofields) also performed throughout August.

"It was delightful to have 'Busking for Vinnies' once again to highlight the musical talents of schools in the community and concurrently raising awareness of the Society's services," said Roydon Ng, St Vincent de Paul Society NSW Metropolitan Schools Engagement Officer. It's wonderful to have Our Lady of Mercy College, Mt Saint Benedict College and St Edmund's College back for another year, as well as welcoming Parramatta Marist High School and St John Paul II Catholic College on board for the first time. It's also a great way for Vinnies to engage with the local community and showcase the services that are available for people to access in the area, including our van services and support centres.

St Vincent de Paul Society NSW members supported close to 11,000 people across Greater Western Sydney over the past financial year. Demand for support in the region increased by 24% from the previous year with close to half of the people assisted experiencing housing stress and more than a third requesting assistance for the first time.

The Metropolitan Schools Engagement Team thanks each of the schools for a series of wonderful musical performances and thanks Winston Hills Conference for providing members to engage with the public in discussing the assistance that is available.

Buddies Day stories

The Buddies Day program has achieved significant success, thanks in large part to grant funding that supports children from families assisted by Vinnies. This program provides these children with valuable opportunities to challenge themselves, interact with their peers, benefit from positive role models, and enjoy a respite from any difficulties they may be facing at home.



We offer two distinct types of Buddies Day Programs. The first involves educational outings, such as visits to venues like the Reptile Park, where children engage in hands-on learning about native Australian fauna and flora. The second type of program involves activities conducted at local high schools. Here, high school students design and lead activities for the children, gaining experience in volunteer work. Activities have included cupcake decorating, tie-dyeing t-shirts, various arts and crafts, ball games, dance parties, treasure hunts, face painting, and more.

Several success stories highlight the impact of the program.

For instance, Rachel (name changed for privacy) had recently relocated to the area after her family was displaced due to domestic violence. Over a six-month period in a Vinnies safe house, Rachel participated in five Buddies Day events. She remained highly engaged throughout, with her favourite part being the fun bags filled with toys and prizes. Upon moving to more stable housing, Rachel excitedly shared with her case worker, "I now have enough toys to put in my new room."

Another example is Joey (name changed for privacy), who joined the program four months ago. Initially, Joey was very quiet, shy, and reserved, staying close to his sister during his first Buddies Day and avoiding participation in activities. However, with the continued support of students and Vinnies volunteers, Joey gradually began to engage more. By his second Buddies Day, he started interacting independently with other children and volunteers. By the end of that day, he was so enthusiastic about the experience that he eagerly enquired about the next event for the following week. These success stories underscore the significance of the Buddies Day program and its positive impact on children at a crucial developmental stage.

The Buddies Day program plays a crucial role in enriching the lives of children from families supported by Vinnies, offering them invaluable opportunities for growth, social interaction, and joy during challenging times. The positive transformations observed in participants, such as increased confidence and engagement, highlight the program's profound impact.

Giving a hand up for Vinnies



Each Anti-Poverty Week, the St Vincent de Paul Society NSW holds the Rosalie Rendu Forum, a discussion bringing together a panel of distinguished women, named in recognition of Sister Rosalie Rendu's contribution to the Society, to offer insights into pressing social justice issues.

The 2024 Rosalie Rendu Forum put the focus on rental reform by proposing the question, "is ending no grounds evictions the end of the story?"

We were delighted to have Trina Jones (NSW Rental Commissioner), Dr Jemima Mowbray (Tenants' Union of NSW), Dr Penelope Bowyer-Pont (Macquarie University) and Anna Scott (Vinnies Services) join us for an online discussion moderated by Solange Frost (Vinnies South Regional Director).

Issues raised during the evening included the experiences of people supported by the Society in navigating the rental market, the impact of the government's proposed reforms, examples of rent regulation from around the world, the need to improve the quality of rental housing and giving renters the confidence to exercise their rights.

The panel also fielded questions from close to 100 attendees watching online and at viewing events on topics such as fair limits for rent increases, offering tenants longer-term leases, reforms for boarding houses and the role of the NSW Rental Commissioner.


The evening concluded with each of the panelists offering hopes for the future:

Imagine an Australia where people have affordable and healthy housing that feels like home. Where everyone can live safely within their own homes and be treated with respect in their relationships. Or where everyone can access the daily essentials they need - like nutritious food and affordable energy.

These are just some of the aspirations that the Society NSW's new Social Justice Statements set out. You can find them now on the Social Justice website. The Statements, approved by State Council, outline the Society's social policy positions. They were developed by the Policy and Advocacy Team in collaboration with the NSW Social Justice Committee following consultation with staff, services and the sector.

Together the Social Justice Statements set out the Society NSW's recommendations in eight priority areas of homelessness, housing, renting, cost of living, domestic and family violence, drug and alcohol, climate justice and temporary protection visa. A First Nations Social Justice Statement is currently under consultation and development.

So how can you help to promote our recommendations to create a more just and compassionate society? We encourage all members, volunteers and staff to read and promote these Statements. In particular, you can help by advocating for the recommendations set out in the Statements with your local MP or local council member and discuss the key issue/s that your region, suburb or community faces.

Vinnies members opening doors for a Mum and children

Two caring St Vincent de Paul Society members completed a home visit to a Mum and her two children. The family of three were renting one room in a house filled with other renters – all strangers to the Mum and her children. Due to the children living in overcrowded conditions, the members phoned Safeguarding with their concern. The members were happy for Safeguarding to call the Mum to discuss possible supports.

During the Mum's discussion with Safeguarding, it came out that she didn't want to engage with any housing services for help as she had thought that it meant she and her children would have to move to the outer suburbs of Sydney, disrupting the childrens' schooling and social networks. She thought her only option to remain living in her local area was to save harder to eventually afford a private rental whilst living in one room in a house of strangers.

Vinnies members continue to help with food and material supports, and the call to Safeguarding resulted in opening doors for the Mum to seek support from housing providers and find alternative accommodation in her local area.
