
As this is my last Broken Bay President's report I would like to thank you all for entrusting me with this leadership position. It has been a privilege to walk with you all as you assist God's marginalized.



- c) The Sunday Pastoral Care Team for Mass and the Morning Tea – Joy Bowen is a contact here.



ST VINCENT DE PAUL CONFERENCE PLANNED FOR THE ICONIC MATTHEW TALBOT HOSTEL WOOLLOOMOOLOO



First Mass, tour and Q&A on Sunday 14 March, 2021

Background

The Matthew Talbot Hostel was established by the Members of the St Vincent de Paul Society (the Society) in 1938 and started its mission with 11 beds and 100 meals a day.

It was dedicated, as a hostel for "friendless" men, and was blessed on 25 October 1938 by the Archbishop of Sydney, Norman Gilroy. It was named after Dublin dockworker and reformed alcoholic, Matt Talbot.

By 1944, the hostel was providing 1,600 meals a week. The hostel was first located at the St. John's Church building, 420 Kent Street. It was later transferred to Ozanam House in Young Street in December 1952 and later to its present location in Woolloomooloo.

The Matthew Talbot Hostel Shelter for homeless men caters for men over the age of 21, who need temporary crisis accommodation and/or other support. In addition to the 98 beds, the other services offered, through the facility, are accessed by more than 35,000 men each year. These include a primary health care medical clinic, meals, restrooms, chapel, pastoral care, counselling, case work and basic facilities.

Today, the Society, a lay Catholic organisation, supports the role of pastoral care in the development and care of the people we serve. At the Talbot, a regular Sunday Mass is celebrated in the Chapel, by local priests. This tradition is vital in encouraging spirituality and faith and has been a criterion of the role of pastoral care through the new strategic direction, ensuring the creation of the new Mission, Spirituality and Pastoral Care Directorate.

With a consistent pastoral presence based at the Matthew Talbot Hostel, an available office space, a roster of clergy that attend each Sunday to celebrate Mass and our men open to gentle support it seems a God given opportunity to explore and call for a **St Vincent De Paul Conference** at the iconic Talbot to support these Mission based goals.

Beginning the journey

The development of a new Conference at the Matthew Talbot has been in conversation for several years. Now, due to the Company restructures, space and key staff, more than ever before, it appears to be the most opportune time to move this vital initiative forward. To this purpose, Tony Cranney, Central Council President for Sydney, has been in conversations with Leo Tucker, Executive Director, Mission and Spirituality and Joy Bowen, of the Mission Team based at the Matthew Talbot. Tony understands and supports this proposal from the Mission team and is responding to the needs of the State Council in developing Conferences. The initial role of a Conference at the Matthew Talbot Hostel, Woolloomooloo will be a spiritual/pastoral role, which is encouraged in our Vincentian Rule in that "Promoting a life of prayer and reflection, both at the individual and community level, and sharing with their fellow members" and that "Vincentians are sincerely concerned with the deeper need and the spiritual wellbeing of those they help..."

The Conference shall be firmly based in the Talbot Hostel where space is allocated for that distinct purpose, so that the men at the Talbot are the primary recipients of care. Joy Bowen, Spirituality, Mission and Pastoral Care partner will be responsible for the enhancement of pastoral skills and supervisory support to each individual and group, she can also fill the space of spiritual advisor until one is nominated. Further ministries of Conference members could include intentional friendship, practical assistance in providing household needs when men are housed, involving the men in games, activities, eventually across the Woolloomooloo site, including the Ozanam Learning Centre. Of course,if Conference membership is not where you feel called, a volunteer role at the Ozanam Learning Centre or the Matthew Talbot is available through our Volunteer Coordinator.

Woolloomooloo staff too are invited to join the Matthew Talbot Conference. That is, to do a little volunteering for the Hostel, on days and times that suit you, and reflect on the ministry with the Conference group of good-hearted people once a month, (btw, you don't need to be a Catholic to join!)

Labor MPs David Harris, Liesl Tesch and David Mehan are backing calls for more social housing on the **Central Coast**

Labor MPs on the Central Coast have thrown their support behind a call from the St Vincent de Paul Society for a commitment from the State Government to provide more social housing in the region, with latest figures showing the waitlist still tops 3,000.

The Society is calling on the Government to build an additional 5,000 new social housing properties state-wide each year for the next decade to address the current waitlist. St Vincent de Paul Society Central Coast Social Justice Representative, Denis O'Rourke, said latest government figures show 46,000 general social housing applicants in NSW and a further 5,300 listed as priority up to the end of June 2020, with 3004 on the Central Coast alone.

"Each applicant represents a household, meaning the number of people, including children, who are without a place to call

Mehan, said it should be no surprise to anyone that the Central Coast public housing waiting list has increased. "There is less public housing on the Coast now than when the current State Coalition Government was elected in 2011," he said. "Answers provided to questions on notice by the Member for The Entrance show that the total number of social housing dwelling on the Coast in 2011 was 4565. "By 2020 this had fallen to 4343 – a reduction of 222 dwellings over the period. "Many of these dwellings have been sold to the private sector in what is effectively the privatization of public housing."

Member for Gosford, Liesl Tesch, said it was unfortunate to see regular opposition to social and affordable housing developments due to unfair beliefs about the kinds of people who might move in. "The reality is that more than half of people in social housing are single pensioners, and a number are families in dire need," she said.

Shadow Minister for the Central Coast and Member for Wyong, David Harris, also supported calls for more social housing. "On existing social housing properties remaining empty for a long period of time [waiting] on repairs," he said.

Parliamentary Secretary for the Central Coast, Adam Crouch, said the Government was aware of calls to build more new social housing on the Central Coast and was working to identify local demand for suitable homes and recycle ageing, outdated properties to build more new homes. "This reinvestment program also delivers new homes to support vulnerable people while generating jobs and spending in the construction sector, to help boost NSW's economic recovery from COVID-19," Crouch said. "Recognising the ability to deliver these multiple benefits, this financial year the NSW Government increased the budget for social housing investment by over 80 per cent.

"This includes almost \$900M to accelerate the delivery of thousands of new homes and create up to 3,000 jobs. "Of this, \$812M is for new and upgraded housing across the state, and \$80M to support new housing sector pre-apprenticeships, apprenticeships and cadetships, and help deliver 100 new social homes.

"This new funding takes the total NSW Government investment in social and affordable housing to \$4.4B over four years. "The NSW Government also continues to invest in the growth of the community housing sector and working together we have delivered more than \$3.2B in social housing properties since 2014-15.

"In the next five years, LAHC is on track to deliver more than 3,200 new homes across NSW, while Community Housing Providers are expected to contribute nearly 3,000 social and affordable homes over the next couple of years." **Terry Collins**

 - Volunteer/s work closely with external organisations like Fiam (Faith in Action), Catholic Care, We Care Connect, Shoebox Revolution, Share the Love & Uniting Doorways to holistically provide wraparound support/assistance to the PWA's.
 - Volunteer Hamper Room Sue also ensures that nothing is wasted. All plastics are recycled through COLES & all left over fruit & vegetables are given to our neighbor Tony at the "Warrior Centre" & he makes soup from it and gives it to the kids that attend his self-defense or self -confidence classes. All the boxes from Foodbank are provided to local pre-schools who uses them for craft activities.

Chatswood Vinnies Support Centre

This year, in February, I put out a call to action to our Conference Presidents to assist with our Interview Referral Rooms as many of our esteemed volunteers have been unable to continue service due to illness.

In our Chatswood Region, Forestville, Chatswood and Willoughby Conferences have raised their hands to join us to assist the People We Serve on a weekly or bi-weekly basis in our interview room, bringing their home visitation experience to the forefront of our Vinnies Support Centre.

One of the Members of our Youth Team also participates in volunteering in the interview room bringing her own experiences of fighting for social justice, serving people in need and providing essential social and material assistance to the poor.



They have also assisted us in packing items for the Members of our other Conferences to collect for their own journeys to assist the People We Serve with essential food parcels on their home visitations to provide a tangible accompaniment to the food vouchers we also provide.

Our Chatswood Vinnies Support Centre is still recruiting for new volunteers to join us together to learn how to give and share our time and food to the People We Serve as well as learn some new skills and ways of life that have remained hidden from society.

Being able to see life from more than one perspective, allows our internal society to evolve and adapt to the changes of the coming climate and the current pandemic as well as to prepare for the future of assistance and the future of non-profit organisations.

"No work of charity is foreign to the Society"

Our Vinnies Support Centre often has unique ways of helping the People We Assist:

For example:

We had a client who had repeatedly been given differing information from his energy provider regarding his electricity and gas bills. We were able to access an online chat for the energy provider with the client able to view the screen and assist with any questions. From there, we were able to re-instate his hardship plan, secure ongoing payment plans and print out a copy of the transcript for the client to keep on record in case he received any communication from the provider that differentiated from the transcript.

"Conference work includes any form of help that alleviates suffering or deprivation and promotes human dignity and personal integrity. It includes visiting people in their homes, in hospitals, institutions or wherever else they may be found needing aid or comfort. Those who are homeless have a special call on the charity of members."

Through our Vinnies Support Centres, we see a wide range of complex issues affecting the People We Serve. Bankruptcy, Immigration, Bereavement, Family Breakdowns, Housing Affordability, Disability and Job Losses and we use our skills and knowledge to help not only the People We Serve, but also, our Conferences with much needed support with their visitations and campaigns for the Winter and Christmas Appeals.

Good News Story

The "R" story - overcoming the grief of the loss of a mother

Our Parish Priest contacted myself, the local conference president and enquired about emergency accommodation for a man ("R" aged 38 years) who had attended the Sunday evening Mass and was distraught at the thought of returning home to where his mother had passed away the previous day. This family had been assisted by Vinnies from time to time.

I attended the church around 7.45pm and found that Fr Peter had been counseling "R" who was also supported by a friend since 7.00pm. When asked by Fr Peter I advised that there really was no suitable accommodation available through 'Vinnies" that evening on such short notice. The possibility of going to a hotel/motel was considered. After some time R was able to come to terms with his fears and agreed that his friend could take him back to his home and to see how that worked and if not to take "R" to a nearby motel.

The death of his mother was a shock to "R" as she had returned from respite care in the last day or so and this gave "R" confidence that she had recovered her health. R's mother had been in good spirits the day before. "R" made the call to '000' and the events that followed were also understandably very distressing and traumatic.

We assisted in the following ways

- contacting 'R' to see that he was coping with the situation.
- assisting with the search of the 'Electoral Role' to find the sisters of the "C" so as to advise next-of-kin.
- applying to our Regional Office for 'Emergency Funding' to meet the cost of the funeral as quoted by the 'Funeral Home'. The arrangements provided were for a 'No attendance/No Service Cremation' and then Fr Peter conducting a 'Memorial Liturgy' to celebrate the life of "C" at the church which "C" and "R" attended.
- Working with "R" to prepare a suitable "Memorial Liturgy" in conjunction with the Parish Priest and Parish Office Assistant.
- Fr Peter conducted the 'Memorial Liturgy' to celebrate the life of "C". The sisters of the decease and other family members attended.
- Providing a reception after the 'Memorial Liturgy' and providing tea, coffee
 and refreshments. This allowed family and friends to reconnect and offer ongoing support to "R" and to each other. This lead to reconnecting the larger
 family who had lost touch in the previous years.
- Since the 'Memorial Liturgy' we have called "R" to see how he was coping
 after the celebration of his mother's life.

I have to thank Shirley at Hornsby for her guidance throughout. Again, thanks to Shirley and Jodie for the prompt arrangements in providing 'Emergency Funds'. Helen Ryan at W N Bull Funeral Homes showed a sincere and compassionate care for "R". Helen attended as a number of meetings were necessary to finalise the arrangements. Helen was very giving of her time to ensure R's welfare and comfort with the final arrangements. We endeavored to focus at all times on the 'Memorial Liturgy' as the opportunity for "R" to celebrate the life of his mother "C" and honor her memory. I am pleased to say "R" has been able to get on with his life, work through his grief and focus on treasuring his mother's memory.




A Great Demonstration of Vinnies Support for Reconciliation

On top of it all, we also had talks and a Q& A session with experienced Vinnies State Council members Michelle Chahine, Brooke Simmons & Kathleen Thickitt, to learn

everything we could from them. It was amazing being able to learn from them, and it invoked discussions about how we as the youth can both learn from the adult

conferences successes, as well as implement our own ideas and strategies.

All in all, the State Youth Retreat was a great formational support for our team - everyone could feel it. Being able to be in one room with all the members of our State Youth Team reinvigorated my passion for the team and projects. All the sessions, lessons, and reflections made the experience worthwhile – the retreat was something that the team really needed.


